

MARTIN HANSSON & LEIF OLBERIUS

Martin Hansson, comedian and magician with sharp tongue and nimble fingers who has enchanted audiences all over the world. His experience and speed gives him a highly energetic style, as a spectator there is only one thing to do: let yourself be swept away.

Martin's rough but tongue-in-cheek image and his astounding ability to hold an audience, will make any performer green with envy and any audience blue from lack of oxygen. If you haven't seen Martin earlier, you really have something to look forward to. His at the same time warm and sarcastic humour has brought down the house everywhere.

Did you know?

That Martin is a master of improvisation.

That he once magically managed to bend not only a spoon but a ladle in front of a surprised cruise ship staff.

That he had 63 sold out houses during a tour in Japan.

That he was once engaged to perform a magic show in a sauna in front of eighteen naked Finnish ladies.

That he once, as a young man, travelled through Europe, all the way down to Jordan, with a deck of playing cards as his only means of earning a living.

Leif Olberius started out as a magic wonder kid, performed on national TV as a 13 year old, competing and winning prizes in Swedish and Nordic competitions. In his late teens he turned his interest towards theater. He went to theatre school, and then he started his own theatre company. Somehow, he eventually returned to magic – with tools and knowledge few others in magic have.

Apart from performing himself, he has been coaching and directing a lot of other magicians and circus acts.

Leif directed the FISM-acts for Jacob Schenström and Martin Hansson, and he is one of the teachers at Tom Stones magic workshops.

He has performed throughout Sweden and Europe, toured in Japan with Martin Hansson, and has spent half a lifetime on cruise ships. He has written and performed a number of theatre plays with magic content, using magic as a theatrical tool.

For some reason Leif also likes taking old magic tricks, even old cane and silk magic, finding new ways of putting them together, and using them as pieces in his own show.

He received the El Duco award in 2017 for his work to elevate the artistic level of magic in Scandinavia.

Leif is also one of the four members of the Mystique show that appeared in Stockholm 2017 and went on until the pandemic hit, with a few more appearances last year.

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he first Amsterdam Bar Magic Show took place at Café de Buurvrouw, a colourful baroque bar nearby Rokin. The place looks like a welcoming museum of the weird, an ideal setting for this particular kind of magic experience. What was the difference with the regular Amsterdam Magic Show you may ask? Well, Bar Magic is actually a category of its own and this first Amsterdam Bar Magic show was a good representation of it: full of direct and hard-hitting effects, with uncensored humor, that the audience did easily follow, even after a few drinks... Here the hecklers were welcome and did well during the show! The magicians were not wearing ties and were talking with no filter with the audience but also between them.

The audience was mainly sitting on tall bar stools in front of the performance space which just composed of a humble little table and two chairs also occupied by spectators, the performer staying up. The magicians not performing were sitting on each side of the performance space. This open view backstage becomes part of the show: magicians were sometimes throwing invectives and interjections during the performance or commenting with sarcasm creating a unique dynamic show. Stefano Rosa started the show with some effects of incredible synchronicities with Tarot Cards, then Fritz with a Z did a series of quick effects from a street card game to cash money transfer to multiple cards lost

and found. After the break, during which everyone took a drink, Killian Petrick, even crazier than usual, did poker demonstrations, no strings attached. Rico Weeland continued with cards and coin effects in the hands of the participants and closed the show with a mesmerizing linking rings presentation.



The feedback from the audience members after-show: they really enjoyed it, feeling part of this more playful and direct presentation that could become a new regular venue for the Amsterdam Magic Show. Keep yourself updated for the next one.



he best magicians of the 21st century set out on a journey to search for the lost author of the most mysterious book on the art of sleight of hand.

MOTIVATION OF THE FILMMAKER

Hans-Joachim Brucherseifer, the filmmaker, spent seven years of his life learning magic tricks from a book that is known as the bible of card magic. It was first published in 1902. today it is regarded as one of the most important treasures of knowledge in the world of magic. From day one he was eager to find out more about the mind behind this book. when he has remained unclear. Through his research, he became aware of many fascinating stories connected to the subject. They are the core of this documentary and are all based on true events.

PLOT

S.W. Erdnase... The pseudonym of the most notorious hustler of the 19th century. Today his book "The Expert at The Card Table" is known as the bible of card magic. It is a must-read for every magician. the value of the document was not recognized until 30 years after its release - too late for the author to witness the success of his work and too late for every sleight-of-hand artist who would have liked to get to know him. His true identity is still unknown and makes for a mystery that leaves even the best illusionists in the dark.



The greatest magicians of the present set out on a journey to search for the lost genius. They report on his alleged suicide and tell stories that make your blood run cold. There seems to be no proof for any of the countless myths and legends surrounding the writer but the search makes one realize the true value of his work. Furthermore, insights into the history of advantage play are provided. They show the origin of some of the best-guarded secrets of modern wizardry.

REALISATION & STYLE

The film takes place in two different time periods. While the present-day search for Erdnase is shown in a documentary style, all flashbacks to the beginning of the 20th century are staged and scripted from end to end. Archive footage will be used in moderation. The combination of Cinema Verite with elements of a heist-drama is especially highlighted on a visual level. The style of all scenes from the past is defined by high-contrast images with a 16mm film look. In contrast to that, all interviews and documentary sequences share the characteristically clean image of a digital camera. Since the audience should not get the impression that any illusions in the film are created with a computer, CGI is used as little as possible. almost every effect which is necessary to visualize the story is created on set. Furthermore, great attention is paid to the historical accuracy of all reenacted scenes. Besides the predominantly informative aspect of the film, cutting back and forth between the lines of action of the protagonists creates tension. Erdnase is shown in his full appearance throughout the film but his demeanor

does not reveal anything about him. His character is built up like a magic trick.

Florian Byer aka Yann Yuro



Florian Byer, A.K.A. Yann Yuro as S.W. Ernase. He is the German champion of mentalism and a professional actor. Studying illusions for more than 20 years lead him to a point where he no longer relies on rabbits, ropes, and ribbons of silk. His weapon of choice is the mind of the spectator. In his shows, he controls the attention of the audience so cunningly that it seems as if he knew the thoughts of everybody around him. The only tool he uses from time to time is a deck of playing cards. Joining the German Magic Circle has enabled him to perform internationally and on TV his exceptional skills on stage prove equally impressive in front of the camera.

Alfonso Rituerto as himself



Alfonso is a specialist in card and coin tricks and won several awards in various competitions over the last few years. he currently lives in Leipzig and performs theatrical magic shows regularly. Born in Segovia, Spain he is a representative of what has become known as "the Spanish school of magic". He learns almost exclusively from books and is a strong proponent of the classic approach to studying magic: no online purchases of tricks, no video download.

INTENTION

The film is aimed at both, magicians who are already familiar with the story about Erdnase and everybody with a general interest in illusions. The viewers are offered a look behind the scenes of historical and contemporary magic. Thereby they get to the bottom of human curiosity. The movie raises a question of conscience: what is better - being ignorant and fascinated or being enlightened and disenchanted? The creation of legends is another key element of the documentary. Erdnase is a perfect example of how people assign meaning to stories or persons, despite having very limited information about them. the viewers are encouraged to question what they believe to know about their role models..

As a gambling enthusiast I have a little less with the "I have no idea how this is possible" or "I don't care" style of performing but there was certainly a bathtub filled with information to think about in each one's act. And let's talk a little bit about how this man plays a stadium full of a few thousand (??) with a deck of cards. Just cards! How beautiful and simple at the same time can magic actually be?

We as the Amsterdam Magic Show have of course not been sitting still. In addition to Rico who participated in the aforementioned competition, we also entertained the VIPs during the gala show. And in my opinion, we put up a very good evening with entertainment (in a way that only we know and do) in the Magic Bar in Sofia. In a way as I described before: slightly chaotic, a bit too much alcohol, and above all topnotch magic.

Mystery & History Mergan



Isaac Fawkes was known as The Sleight of Hand Man

Isaac Fawkes, The Sleight of Hand Man, was a popular showman in the early 1700s. He was often satirized for practicing what was considered a low-brow art. Painter and critic William Hogarth frequently mocked his show and scorned local audiences' taste for a stage "debauch'd by fooleries." Fawkes, undeterred,



publicly trumpeted his financial success, bragging about putting "seven hundred Pounds into the Bank," a convincing argument for artistic merit. He rose to fame in the 1720s and become a popular cultural figure, the name 'Fawkes' becoming synonymous with the skillful conjuror, and depictions of him appear in engravings by William Hogarth. Fawkes was not the first fair conjurer and neither was he particularly innovative in his routines (though he did make copious use of the recently invented Egg Bag). One of Fawkes' advertisements described his routine in some detail: He takes an empty bag, lays it on the Table and turns it several times inside out, then commands 100 Eggs out of it and several showers of real Gold and silver, then the Bag beginning to swell several sorts of wild fowl run out of it upon the Table. He throws up a Pack of Cards, and causes them to be living birds flying about the room. He causes living Beasts, Birds, and other

Creatures to appear upon the Table. He blows the spots of the Cards off and on and changes them to any pictures Despite his contemporary fame, his first name was forgotten until the record of his burial was rediscovered by Houdini in the records of St. Martin-in-the-Fields church in Trafalgar Square, London in 1904. Fawkes is frequently associated with the annual Bartholomew and Southwark Fairs in London, where his booth was a great attraction. His act consisted of conjuring, contortionism, and the exhibition of mechanical devices made by the famous clockmaker Christopher Pinchbeck, with whom he had a longstanding collaboration. His success had, in part, to do with the recently created Egg Bag, which he used extravagantly. He was also popular for throwing a pack of cards into the air where they were transformed into birds. In Round About Our Coal Fire, Fawkes is described as one of the "Old heroes in Magick". While Fawkes was performing at one of the fairs early in 1732 a fire broke out in a neighboring booth and frightened his wife, Alice, so severely that she had to go into an "early confinement". Whether this fire was connected to Fawkes' death later that year is not known. Fawkes died on 25 May 1732 and was buried at St Martin-in-the-Fields, Westminster three days later. He had amassed a considerable fortune to leave to Alice; reports at the time suggested he "had honestly acquired a fortune of above ten thousand pounds, being no more than he really deserved for his great ingenuity, by which he surpassed all that ever pretended to be art." He was succeeded by his son, who continued the collaboration with the Pinchbeck family, though did not enjoy the popular success of his father.





Out of sight out of my

Symbolism is a wonderful, magical and mystical thing



I It is something that we can trace back to Paleolithic times when cave paintings were made of a shaman laying on the ground in a trance wearing a birdlike mask (the symbol of transcendence and freedom) (Jung, Franz, Henderson, Jacobi & Jaffè, 1964, p.147). But symbolism is also something that we can see in more recent times with ever-improving new psychological discoveries and the exploration of the abyss that we call the unconscious mind.

The unconscious or subconscious mind as Freud would call it the part of our consciousness where all the memories and knowledge that we have forgotten goes. But of course, that is not the only function of the unconscious mind. The unconscious mind is also a place where a big part of our identity lies and where we push parts of our personality that we deny our shadow. (Jung & Franz, 1964, p.171). Our unconscious mind doesn't communicate with a sense of logic, very often it shows us images in terms of symbolism in a haptic and chaotic way as can be seen in our dreams (Jung & Franz, 1964, p.3).

Our conscious mind, on the other hand, likes to communicate logically, it likes drama

structures that have a beginning a middle, and an end (Aristotle, 2013, p. 26) that structure has some logic to it and it tends to be the way that we tell each other stories. It starts here, then this happened and this is how it ended. That's a satisfying storyline and it feels right and complete. The unconscious mind however doesn't care about this concept whatsoever. It just gives you a dream where you have a scary experience, and you finally find a piece of treasure which then turns you into a bird and you wake up. That's it. You might wake up confused asking yourself what this dream meant, or you might wake up not remembering or caring about it at all.

The dream that the unconscious mind sends our way however was filled with symbolism. Symbolism which we can trace back to mythology, fairy tales, and even to art. Mythology has always had an important role in us as humans. It was used to give meaning to life, to explain the universe, to establish social order, and for the psychological development of the individual (Campbell, 2004, p.3). It is even believed that mythology has become a part of the human collective unconscious (Campbell, 2008, p.6) and that it will come back in different stages of our life, our subconscious mind uses it to tell us things.

Mythology has also always had an important role in carrying the human spirit forward and helping us to endure difficult times (Campbell, 2008, p.6). It has helped us to develop ourselves and to give us direction in life. It is even said that discovering your myth can be your pathway to bliss. If this wasn't true then why would Jung have spent most of his life searching for his personal myth? Knowing the above, how do mythology and symbolism translate into art? Well since symbolism and mythology have had such a big impact on the human race throughout history and it has helped many humans through tough times (remember even biblical stories and stories from the Quran are mythology). It can be translated into art and it should be, that's the point of art after all: "To translate wisdom and knowledge into experience" (Campbell, 1990, p.33).

That is exactly why symbolism is so important. It points to something deeper, something that will have a lasting impact on the human being that sees the piece of art, and so following Gabi's ultimate conception, the human being who enters the show will be a different one than the one leaving the show. Symbolism is always found in mythology and as mentioned earlier it helps us to develop psychologically. In every mythology there is some lesson to be learned, some aspect of ourselves that needs honoring, and there are many answers to life's existential questions. When symbolic aspects are properly used in art, or in our case magic, it will have a transformative experience on the beholder. At least, it leaves the doors open for this experience to happen. We have to understand that we can't force someone into a certain experience. But, as long as the images are present, we can potentially change someone's life.

This of course is not the only role of putting symbolism in art. It can also give our art more depth and if properly constructed we can create something enjoyable for everyone. We could construct our magic in such a way that people who are just there for simple fun can

experience that, while people who are open to something deeper can have a deeper experience. The point of putting symbolism into art is that we are creating something to speak to the unconscious mind and at the same time it will feel very safe. It feels meaningful and if not overdone it will leave your audience with a poetic and beautiful experience.

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
